National Grid Reference:
 The grid lines form part of the national grid and are at 100 metre intervals. To give a reference defining the position of a point to within 10 metres proceed as follows:
 EXAMPLE: M in Milton Down

Eastings:
 Take west edge of 100 metre square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on the east or west margin.
 Example: 198

Northings:
 Take south edge of 100 metre square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on the east or west margin.
 Example: 458
