The number and acreage of each parcel of land is shown within the parcel. It is important when identifying a parcel to specify the number (s) of the plan(s) on which it falls.

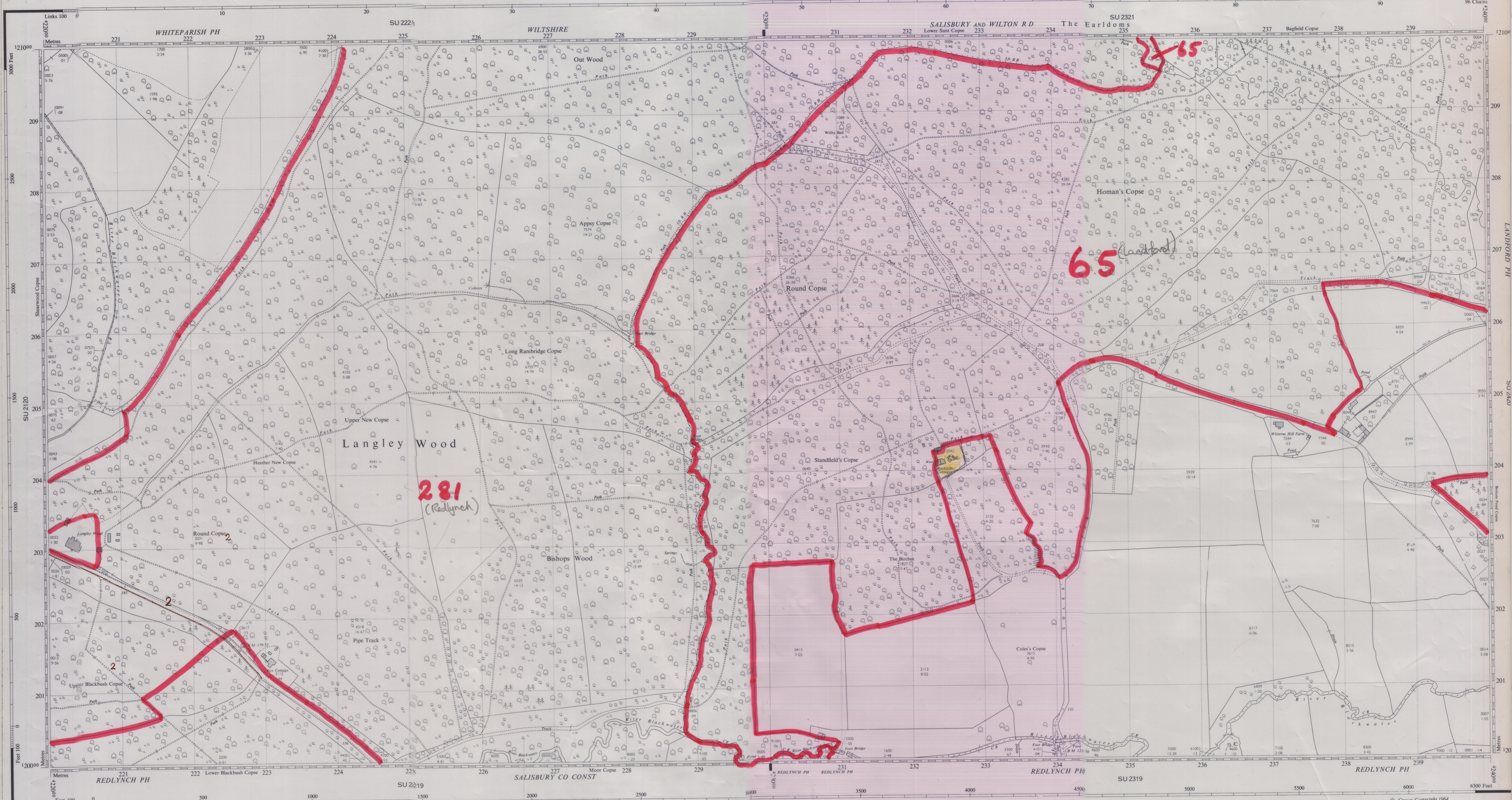

Take west edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on NORTH and SOUTH margins	Take south edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on EAST and WEST margins
